

# **Host a Civic Engagement Gathering!**

Want to meet scientists and engineers who are making a difference in your community?

Want to inspire scientists and engineers to get more involved with your local government?

# What is a Civic Engagement Gathering?

Our model is simple. Invite a few scientists and engineers who are making a difference in your community to share their experiences in an informal setting. This approach provides a low pressure opportunity for exchanging experiences and ideas, while also helping you cultivate a network of civic-minded peers.

# Why host a Civic Engagement Gathering?

Through our outreach in the STEM community, we've learned that bringing civic-minded people together and sharing the experiences of those already making an impact can be a great way to encourage others to become more active citizens. From serving on commissions and advisory boards to volunteering with a science museum, the existing avenues to making a difference are numerous...but often unknown. A Civic Engagement Gathering provides an informal setting to learn more about how people with STEM backgrounds can engage locally.

### How do you host a Civic Engagement Gathering?

We have simplified our event model over time to minimize the planning effort. You will need to:

- **Secure a time and location for hosting the event.** We've found that early evening (~6pm) on a weekday in the back room of a coffee shop or brewery works well for most attendees. If you check ahead, many venues are happy to reserve a space without charging a fee or a minimum.
- Identify a few "featured guests" to share their local engagement experiences. Think broadly, because there are many ways for scientists and engineers to impact their communities. A local commissioner, a state or city employee, a local volunteer, or an elected official might make a great featured guest. - Plan the agenda ahead of time. We suggest planning a short "formal" program where
  you share a few remarks about the importance of local civic engagement, introduce your
  featured guests, give them 3-5 minutes to talk about their experiences engaging
  locally...and, of course, direct your attendees to ESAL's online resources.
- Advertise the event in your local community. Share on social media and local listservs that reach people who would be interested in attending.
- Make sure the event goes smoothly...and enjoy meeting people who share your
  interests! Arrive at the event site a few minutes early to make sure everything is in order
  and hang signs directing people to the event space if needed. We recommend having a



- sign-up sheet and name tags. If your event draws people from a broad metro area, ask people to include their city so they can more easily identify their neighbors.
- **Document the event.** Take photos and jot down some key notes for a blog post about the event. It can also help to do a brief interview with your featured guests.
- **Build momentum toward ongoing engagement.** Have attendees commit to one of the activities in the Local Engagement Checklist...perhaps they can be a "featured guest" at your next event!

#### How can ESAL support your Civic Engagement Happy Hour?

ESAL can help make your event a success in several ways:

- **Event and logistics templates.** Use our templates for everything from email invitations to featured guests to detailed "programs" for how to structure your events.
- Funding for food, supply, or venue costs. Apply for up to \$500 for event costs, excluding alcohol purchases, per event from ESAL's Local Civic Engagement Support Grant Program.
- *Identifying "featured guests"*. Need help finding engineers and scientists to feature at your event? ESAL's <u>nationwide network</u> can help find someone near you.
- Advertising your event. ESAL will include your event on our website and advertise through our social media accounts.
- **Managing event RSVPs.** ESAL will create an RSVP form and manage responses so that you know how many attendees to expect.
- Local Engagement handouts. ESAL will send you materials such as copies of our Local Engagement Checklist, pens, and decals to hand out at your event.
- Publishing a guest post about your event. Civic Engagement Gatherings often spark
  insights or produce advice that can benefit many. ESAL will help you edit and publish a
  guest post about your event on our blog to broaden the reach of your event.

#### Sounds awesome! Where's the legal fine print?

For ESAL to support your event, we ask you to stick to a couple of guidelines:

- Political Advocacy As a 501(c)(3) non-profit, ESAL does not engage in political
  advocacy. This means no endorsing or fundraising for candidates for office. To avoid the
  appearance of doing so, we ask that you not feature guests who are actively
  campaigning (elected officials or past candidates are fine as long as the event does not
  give the appearance of endorsing their political views or affiliations).
- **Issue Advocacy** ESAL believes that local decisions require local input, and we do not take positions on specific solutions or policies. While we are happy to support events that are focused on sharing thoughts and ideas about an issue area, we cannot support events that advocate for or endorse legislation or a specific policy outcome.
